

84% of parents indicated their child was <u>not</u> currently enrolled in a college or a dual high school-college program


Types of College(s) Child is Interested in Applying To



Child's Current Year in School




Number of Colleges Child Plans on Applying To









Types of College(s) Interested in Applying To

Number of Colleges Plan On Applying To





Parent Survey: Financial Costs


To what extent do you agree with each of the following statements related to financial aid and college costs?

Parent Survey: Paying for College

How does your child <u>currently</u> plan on paying for college?




Of the 44% of parents who indicated their family will make contributions to their child's college costs:

- 64% will rely on **general savings**
- 47% will use current earning or paychecks
- 45% will rely on a college savings plan
- 32% will take out a parent loan
- 22% will pay using a credit card
- 15% will rely on retirement accounts
- 8% will take out a home equity loan
- 1% indicated they'd use another method of payment

How confident do you feel about understanding and completing the college admissions and financial process?


Scale: Not Confident to Very Confident

Parents' emotional experiences about the college admissions and financial aid process shift across their children's high school years.


- Excitement and optimism dominate early, but these feelings give way to nervousness, anxiety, and stress during the middle years.
- By the time their child is in their senior year and after graduation, positive emotions like pride and excitement return.

This suggests that sophomore and junior years are ideal for education, support, and reassurance.

Participants selected their Top 5




Nervousness, stress, anxiety and feeling overwhelmed are predominant feelings for parents of high school students, however, those feelings are replaced by feelings of optimism, excitement, and pride, when the child graduates from high school.


To what extent do you agree with each of the following statements related to financial aid and college costs?

How do you currently plan on paying for college?




Of the 48% of students who indicated their family will make contributions to their college costs:

- 61% will rely on their family's general savings
- 56% will use current earning or paychecks
- 32% will rely on loans
- 11% **did not know** how their family would contribute

How confident do you feel about understanding and completing the college admissions and financial process?



Student Survey: Socio-Emotional Responses

When you think about the college admissions and financial process, you feel...

Participants selected their Top 5



Nervousness and anxiety remain prominent emotional experiences throughout the high school and post-high school experience.

As students enter high school as **first years**, they feel anxious, excited, and nervous while also reporting feeling optimistic and overwhelmed.

By their **sophomore year**, anxiety intensifies and excitement and nervousness remain strong.

In their **junior year**, anxiety and nervousness remain high, while excitement drops slightly.

As **seniors**, students continue to report high levels of nervousness and anxiety, but feelings of excitement and optimism rise slightly as they approach graduation.

After graduating, emotions remain mixed. **Graduates** feel excited and proud, but also continue to experience anxiety and nervousness
